USJ-R CONFERS HONORIS CAUSA ON CARDINAL JOSE SANCHEZ

Other significant celebrations timed for the coming of the Holy Father in Manila passed almost unnoticed, overshadowed by the magnitude of the 10th World Youth Day. This year marked the 4th Centenary of the elevation of Manila to an Archdiocese and the establishment of the Dioceses of Cebu in the Visayas, Caceres in Bicol and Nueva Segovia in Ilocos Sur (1595-1995). For these ecclesiastical territories, 400 years of existence is a cause of pride and jubilation. For the whole Filipino nation as well!

It was in this context of grateful celebration that University of San Jose-Recoletos, joining Archdiocese of Cebu's jubilee, did its little but meaningful contribution. It conferred the Degree of Doctor in Humane Letters, Honoris Causa on His Eminence Jose T. Cardinal Sanchez last April, 1995. The fitting venue was USJ-R's Center of Performing Arts. The conferment of the Degree "is a distinct gesture of the university to recognize the exemplary lifework of

His Eminence ... in the Teaching, Priestly and Episcopal Ministries." Honorable DECS Secretary Ricardo T. Gloria conferred the Degree. Fr. Emeterio Buñao, OAR, awarded the diploma and medal. CHED Region 7 Director, Dr. Ma. Lilia Gaduyon imposed the hoods and caps on the honoree assisted by Dr. Milagros C. Espina and Dr. Mariano M. Lerin, respective deans of the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences and the Graduate School of Business and Management.

A native of Pandan, Catanduanes, Cardinal Sanchez was ordained priest on May 12, 1946 in Naga City. In 1968, he became auxiliary bishop of Caceres, then bishop of Lucena in 1976 and in 1982 archbishop of Nueva Segovia. In his ad limina visit in 1985, the Holy Father asked him to remain in the Eternal City to work in the Roman Curia. He was the first Filipino prelate to work in the Vatican. He was appointed secretary of the enormous Congregation for the Evangelization of Peoples popularly known as the





Propagation of the Faith on October 30, 1985. His office then was a walking distance from a Recollect house, St. Ildephonse Residence at Via Sistina. In 1991, John Paul II made him a Cardinal and on July 1 of the same year appointed him Prefect of the Congregation for the Clergy. In this capacity, he is *ex-officio* president of the Pontifical Commission for the Preservation of the Artistic and Historical Patrimony of the Church.

In a recent Vatican interview, Cardinal Sanchez expresses his fidelity to the teaching duty of the Church. "The bishop," he says," must safeguard and transmit all that the Church teaches, the deposit of faith we have received, and this without changing any of it." Eminently a teacher, he affirms: "The Church must always be merciful but it must also teach what Jesus Christ himself wanted it to teach." His motto in his coat of arms is "Lord teach me to do your will." Teaching-education- is running in his veigo USJ-Recoletos as an educational institution did rightly to give him recognition. personifies the Church, the boat or Christ, the Ultimate Teacher.

As the first semester of the academic year comes into full swing, most of our Religious in the Philippines today become involved in schools. They may be acting true to the Augustinian manner of life, to Augustine's dimension of teacher and guide that he was both in his secular and episcopal experience. Their school work is a way of continuing the Church's mission of mother and teacher.

University of San Jose-Recoletos in Cebu City, the Recollects' premiere educational institution, conferred on His Eminence Jose T. Cardinal Sanchez the Degree of Doctor of Humane Letters, Honoris Causa, in recognition of his exemplary work in, among others, the "teaching minis-

try." The conferment closely links the Recollect community to the on-going 4th Centenary celebration of the country's four pioneering Dioceses. Coincidentally- and proudly- the Recollects form part of their colorful histories. The Recoletos actively lived within the areas of these ecclesiastical centers and zealously worked for them. In Manila, since 1606 to the present. In Cebu, from 1621 to date. In Caceres (Bicolandia), from 1685-with Masbate- to 1791. In Nueva Segovia (Ilocos), from 1782 to 1796, then from 1874 to 1895. In this brave apostolic endeavor, teaching in all its forms figured as an important ministry. In fact, the OAR's unique presence in the Diocese of Vigan (Nueva Segovia) included 13 years of faithful professorship at the diocesan Conciliar Seminary.

Missionaries from Sierra Leone (West Africa) Recalled

Due to seriously escalating rebel activities in Sierra Leone, two communities of the AR Sisters were recalled to the Motherhouse in the Philippines last February 1995. In 1986, the first community of Recollect Sisters arrived in Bonthe Island in the south to take over the work of the Cluny Sisters in the primary and secondary schools, feeding activity, clinic and scholarship program for poor children. Later, in 1992, another group responded to the need of the people of Yele, in the north, by running a clinic, doing parish work and giving catechism to children. The archbishop and the bishop of the place are hopeful that things would soon return to normal. Then the Sisters would resume their missionary services to the Africans.

Sent to Marcilla, Navarra, Spain for his theological studies, he was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop Arturo Quintanilla on July 12, 1959.



First School in the Country Ever Named in Honor of St. Ezekiel

It is found cuddled between the hills and the scenic Malampaya Sound overlooking one of the richest fishing grounds in the Philippines today. Does it sound? Malampaya Sound is a calm extensive bay that has a form of a natural net belonging to the municipality of Taytay in northern Palawan. In one of the strategic points of the bay thrives a barrio composed mostly of skilled fishermen. It is called Liminangcong.

About twenty years ago, the leader of the locality, Mayor Napoleon Ordoñez called upon the former Apostolic Vicar of Palawan, Most Reverend Gregorio Espiga, OAR, D.D., expressing the people's desire for and need of a school. Immediately, the Bishop with Fr. Federico de la Rosa, OAR, visited the barrio and met with the people. The fastest trip to the place then, as now, was in a pumpboat that took several hours through a stretch of unpredictable sea. But it was for the welfare of the poor people. The barrio folks were to offer a piece of land. Both the Vicariate and the residents would raise funds to start the building. Msgr. Espiga talked with the Mother General of the Augustinian Recollect Sisters in Manila about the project. Mother Bibiana Vendiola, AR, responded favorably and sent several Sisters to make the initial surveys. The first group consisted of Sor Esperanza Heffler, Sor Consuelo Dangan and Mo. Eufemia Lauzon (present mother general). The latter stayed behind while 2 other new Sisters arrived already to start and work for the enrollment. The Sisters' first convent was a remodelled portion of an ice plant building. By April of 1972, the school edifice was shaping up and by June, classes formally opened. There were 70 enrollees with 3 lay teachers. The first designated superior of the new community was Sor Ester Anacleto, AR.

How should the new school be called? Fr. Freddie de la Rosa with a sense of Palawan's historical growth suggested a name deeply related to the apostolic labor of the Recollects in this mission area — Fr. Exequiel Moreno. In the Recollect annals, he was always looked up to as Venerable. At the same time, the Recollect world was then abuzz with the on-going processes leading to the beatification of this model Recoleto missionary. After the academic year opened, the school reports carried the letterhead, Exequiel Moreno High School, Liminangcong, Taytay, Palawan. That was 1972. Three years later, in 1975, the school's name painted on a big board was changed to *Blessed* Exequiel Moreno. And finally in 1991, beaming with pride, it was converted to that of *Saint* Exequiel Moreno.

The present superior is Sister Nena Labrague, AR, with seven teachers and a population of 302 students.St. Ezekiel never reached this humble corner of Palawan. But yes, his Recollect co-missionaries did reach out to this fishing village from El Nido, and later from Taytay.



The Saint however is fondly remembered as one of the founders of Puerto Princesa, the capital, and from here, for having scoured the area southward to Aborlan for native Tagbanuas to bring them to the Faith. He lived in Palawan for about a year (1872-1873). He could have stayed longer. But as if to show solidarity with and closeness to the suffering of the populace, he contracted malaria, the dreaded scourge of the frontier land, and was forced to return quickly to Manila.

St. Exequiel Moreno High School at Liminangcong, Taytay, Palawan stands as the first institution in the Philippines named in honor of the Recoleto Saint. It lives on as a remembrance of St. Ezekiel's short but forceful presence in Palawan, the last missionary bastion of the Recollects in this archipelago.

(Note the spelling difference in Exequiel and Ezekiel).


